Thursday, May 1 at 7:30 PM: Brokenwood Mysteries - Fall from Grace

A surprise guest interrupts the picnic that Kristin, Breen and Gina throw for Mike's birthday. The celebrations come to a halt when they realize that the visitor is Kristin's ex-boyfriend.



Friday, May 2 at 9 PM: *Great Performances - Now Hear This: Barrios: Chopin of the Guitar* Agustin Barrios was born and raised in rural Paraguay, far from the world's artistic capitals, and brought up on folk music. He identified with the Guarani Indians of his home more than the European culture of Spain's former colonies. Through hundreds of concerts and new compositions, he captured the soul of Latin America to become the most important quitar composer of the 20th century



Saturday, May 3 at 1:30 PM: Lucky Chow - Made in Taiwan

Across Taiwan, there's a growing movement to produce familiar pantry staples - soy sauce, hot sauce, tofu, rice - in a hand-crafted way that respects the island's legacy. Two brothers take over the family soy sauce factory; a tofu maker uses traditional methods, as well as water from a bubbling mud volcano; and a collective of young urbanites seek out a life farming rice.



Saturday, May 3 at 9 PM: Queens of Mystery - Death by Vinyl, Part One

The series follows young Detective Sergeant Matilda Stone and her three mystery-writing aunts. Mattie is assigned the unglamorous job of searching for a lost dog, but the case is put on hold when one of the band's members turns up murdered.



Sunday, May 4 at 9 PM: Miss Austen on Masterpiece

In 1830, Cassandra Austen arrives in Kintbury after hearing of her friend Eliza's husband's impending death. But her true motive becomes clear: Cassandra is searching for the letters her sister Jane wrote to Eliza throughout their friendship.



Monday, May 5 at 9 PM: American Delivery

In the U.S. more women die in childbirth than in any other wealthy nation. Amid a growing maternal health crisis, especially for women of color, *American Delivery* explores glimmers of hope, such as women finding their voice and autonomy, nurses listening to women and offering birth choices, and hospital leaders making community-based decisions.



Monday, May 5 at 10 PM: Independent Lens - Matter of Mind: My Alzheimer's - Premiere This documentary is an intimate portrayal of three families confronting the unique challenges of Alzheimer's and how this progressive neurodegenerative disease transforms roles and relationships. Whether it's a partner becoming a caregiver or an adult child shifting into being their parent's caretaker, these stories show how families evolve when a loved one is diagnosed.



Tuesday, May 6 at 10 PM: FRONTLINE - Antidote – Premiere

The U.S. broadcast debut of the award-winning film exposing the cost of opposing Vladimir Putin. The stories of an investigative journalist and a political activist putting their lives on the line standing up to the Kremlin, and the consequences.



Wednesday, May 7 at 8 PM: NATURE - Hummingbirds of Hollywood

Amid the glamour of Hollywood, Terry Masear finds herself on a transformative journey as she nurtures wounded hummingbirds. Meet Cactus, Jimmy, Wasabi, Alexa, and Mikhail, Masear's diminutive patients, as we celebrate their small victories. The compassion and empathy that Masear shows her Lilliputian charges serves as a lesson to us all - the delicate beauty in profound acts of kindness.



Wednesday, May 7 at 9 PM: NOVA - Ultimate Crash Test: Countdown – Premiere (2 parts) Go behind the scenes as scientists make a series of high-stakes decisions to ensure the ambitious experiment goes off without a hitch. They only have one shot. The plan is for 8 drivers to drive 8 different cars by remote control at 70 mph down a hazardous straightaway. The intense preparation for the most ambitious crash test ever conducted culminates in the moment of truth as the cars barrel down an airport tarmac and collide in a multi-vehicle pile-up.



Wednesday, May 7 at 10 PM: Bugs that Rule the World – Premiere (4 parts)


Saturday, May 10 at 11 PM: Austin City Limits - Maren Morris

Thursday, May 15 at 9:30 PM: Julie Andrews Forever

The repercussions resonate in this farce about the complexities of race. *Yellow Face* is an "is-he-or-isn't-he" comedy of identity, show business and autobiography.



Friday, May 16 at 8:30 PM: On Stage at Curtis - Isabella Isza Wu Organ Finding the Key Pursing her Master's in Organ Performance allowed her to take a role at the world's largest pipe organ, the Macy's Wanamaker Organ. Known to many as Isza, she studies Organ with Alan Morrison, Harpsichord with Leon Schellhase and Improvisation with Jeffrey Brillhart.

Monday, May 19 at 7:30 PM: To Dine for with Kate Sullivan - Eva Longoria

Eva Longoria's hit TV show Desperate Housewives made her a household name. Since that time, she has used her fame and her platform to give voice to the Latin experience in America. Eva shares her own personal story of going after a big dream and what that process has taught her about success and the power to uplift the next generation of Latina women.



Monday, May 19 at 9 PM: American Experience - Mr. Polaroid - Premiere

Meet Edwin Land, the visionary scientist and inventor of the Polaroid camera. When introduced in 1948, the Polaroid revolutionized amateur photography -- by the 1970s, people across the globe were shooting over a billion Polaroids a year. The camera helped earn Land a reputation as one of the most visionary and prolific inventors and entrepreneurs of the 20th century. His invention would inspire the leaders of the 1990s tech boom, including Steve Jobs, who saw Land as both a guru and godfather.

Americans seem to have forgotten how to have a public dialog about challenging topics without acrimony. But research shows that audiences are exhausted by the win-lose model. *Deadlock*, offers an alternative - moderator, Aaron Tang, Professor of Law at the University of California, Davis, presents the panel with a hypothetical scenario based on real life situations to pull participants into substantive, challenging and humanizing conversations about key issues.
